# **Effective Communication in English**

### **Course description**

This course is designed to enhance your ability to employ English for academic and professional purposes. In the course, we will work with a range of genres of both written and spoken communication (such as business correspondence, reports, academic papers, oral presentations). You will be given the opportunity to improve your language proficiency through individual and collaborative tasks, which have been designed to develop both written and spoken language skills.

#### This course aims

- to improve your speaking and writing skills in English for academic and professional purposes;
- to familiarise you with a range of written and spoken genres such as business correspondence, reports, academic papers, oral presentations;
- to provide you with an awareness of tools and resources for further development.

#### **Intended learning outcomes**

By the end of the course, you should be able to:

• express yourself correctly and effectively in both spoken and written English in different contexts:

In addition, for the seminars (10 credits):

- recognise various genres and be aware of their aims;
- present your arguments or points of view orally and in writing;

In addition, for the genre project (5 credits):

- produce coherent and structured texts;
- compare different text styles and genres;

#### Grading

The course adopts the 7-grade SU scale (A–F).

To receive a <u>final grade</u>, students must have completed all the examination assignments [not done all examination assignments=no grade].

To receive a <u>passing grade</u> (A to E), students must complete and pass all the examination assignments, and thus demonstrate that they achieved all the learning outcomes at least at the minimum level (see "Grading criteria" below).

#### **Course activities**

The course consists of the following activities:

- Seminars (pre-seminar instructions for each seminar will be posted on Athena);
- Before each seminar, students are expected to finish the assigned reading and do any accompanying tasks. Students should be prepared to discuss the reading and tasks at the seminar;
- Students are expected to complete all the tasks assigned by the teacher.

#### **Examination**

Students are required to complete the following:

For the seminars (10 credits):

- 1. An argumentative text (75% of the final grade): 7-grade SU scale A written essay of 750-1000 words dealing with a (controversial) issue, giving reasons to support your opinion. The aim is to convince the reader to agree with you.
- 2. Oral assignment (25% of the final grade): 7-grade SU scale
  An oral presentation of 5 minutes on any topic you choose, addressed to a
  university-educated, non-specialist audience.
- 3. <u>Assignment tasks</u>: pass/fail
  The tasks include: a paragraph and a formal letter (written), leading a group discussion (oral)

For the genre project (5 credits):

1. <u>Genre project:</u> 7-grade SU scale A written research report of ca. 1000 words, describing a particular genre.

All completed assignments should be submitted on Athena. <u>Late submissions (for graded or ungraded assignments)</u> will not receive any feedback. Students who do not submit all the required assignments during the course can submit such assignments on the retake deadline (5 weeks after the original deadline).
