The global climate change negotiations are in a critical phase. The ambition is to reach a new agreement at the UN Conference in Copenhagen in December 2009, during the Swedish presidency of the EU. Will it be possible? Are the positions of the EU and the USA too diverse?

The program will focus on two of the more critical and difficult legal issues in the ongoing negotiations:

- What character should be given to the accord? One single treaty text, like the Kyoto Protocol, or a looser package of texts bound together by a common vision and agreed within a common framework?
- How should the commitments be defined in light of the differentiated responsibilities of the parties? Should the division between industrialised states and developing states be maintained?
