Course content

Course content: The course provides knowledge about diverse qualitative methods related to narrative analysis. The aim is for the students to learn how to apply these methods in qualitative analysis. The course covers three different approaches to analyse narrative material: Thematic narrative analysis, structural narrative analysis, and performative narrative analysis.

Learning outcomes

In order to receive a passing grade on the course, students are expected to be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

1. Differentiate between different methods in narrative analysis.

Skills and abilities

2. Apply these methods in the analysis of qualitative material. *Judgement and approach*
3. Evaluate one's own analysis in relation to research setting, question, and data.

Teaching

The teaching will be based on lectures and seminars in the form of workshops in which the methods are applied.

Several sessions will require preparatory work consisting of readings or other preparations (see the *Schedule*, below, and *Plans* at the course website in Athena for detailed information on every session, e.g., readings, preparatory work, instructions, and links).

Active participation in the teaching and seminars are mandatory. In case of absence, the student will be given compensatory assignments to be submitted via Athena.



The course will be taught in English.

Forms of examination

Examination I. Individual written assignment

Learning outcomes 1–2 are examined through one practical assignment with individual submission.

Other grading components

Learning outcome 3 is examined through active participation in a seminar. In case of absence from or insufficient participation in the seminar, the student will be given a compensatory assignment.

Course requirements

Active participation in the seminars is a course requirement. In case of absence from or insufficient participation in a seminar, the student will be given a compensatory assignment.

Language

The examination will be in English.

Certificate of special pedagogical support

If the student has a certificate from Stockholm University which recommends special pedagogical support, the examiner has the right to offer the student alternative forms of examination.

The written individual assignment in more detail

Q3.1 – Narrative analysis

Analyse the two life stories that the teacher provides from two perspectives:

- 1) First by doing a thematic narrative analysis
- 2) Secondly by doing a structural narrative analysis

Full instructions for the examination are posted in Athena at the course start.

Late submission

Late submission is not accepted. In such cases, the student is referred to the retake exam.

Plagiarism

All examinations are controlled through a software for detecting plagiarism. Suspicion of cheating, plagiarism or self-plagiarism is reported to the Disciplinary Board at Stockholm University.

For students who have been granted special pedagogical support

Grading criteria

The course grade will be given on a two-point grading scale (G=Pass, U=Fail).

The grading (*pass*) criteria will be presented to the students in writing when the course begins.

In order to receive a passing grade in the course, the student must receive passing G grade on the individual assignment and participation in the seminars.

Two examinations are offered each time the course is taught. For terms when the course is not taught, one examination is offered. Students who receive a failing grade two consecutive times from the same examiner have the right to request a different examiner to grade the examination. This request should be made to the Director of Studies.

Individual assignment and participation in seminars that received a failing U grade can receive a passing G grade with submission of a supplementary assignment, if the student is close to passing.

Interim: Students may request an examination in accordance with this syllabus up to three semesters after the course has ceased or changed significantly.
